



WHAT IS EUROVISION?

The Eurovision Song Contest is 67 years old, but how did it all begin?

As more and more homes started to have televisions in the 1950s, the European Broadcasting Union was formed in 1954. They created the Eurovision Network to share programmes between European countries.

The European Broadcasting Union wanted to see if going live on TV was possible at the same time in different countries. Discussions began to find a programme which would test this.

At the time, song contests were popular in many European countries, so the idea was put forward for the Eurovision Song Contest.

THE FIRST EUROVISION

The first contest took place on 24th May in 1956, and just seven countries took part – Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, The Netherlands and Switzerland.

Austria and Denmark planned to enter but missed the deadline. The United Kingdom sent their apologies as they were already holding their own competition.

Each country submitted two songs. The winning song, 'Refrain', was sung by Lys Assia from Switzerland. Switzerland hosted this contest in Lugano.













WHO TAKES PART?

This year, 37 countries have entered the competition, but only 26 will perform their song at the final. Two semi-finals will take place on the 9th and 11th of May to decide who goes through to the final.

The Big Five do not have to take part in the semi-finals. The 'Big Five' are the Participating Broadcasters from France, Germany, Italy, Spain and the United Kingdom. Because these countries pay the most money to the European Broadcasting Union, they do not have to take part in the semi-finals and go straight through to the final. The host nation also goes through to the final, so Ukraine will join the Big Five this year.

RULES AND REGULATIONS!

Now in its 67th year, rules and guidelines have changed over the years. These are some of the main rules entrants need to follow.

- 1. The songs must be original, never been performed by someone else.
- 2. The lead vocals, singing and speech must be performed live on the night.
- 3. No more than 6 singers/musicians/dancers must be on the stage during any one performance.
- 4. The song must not be more than 3 minutes long.
- 5. The singer/s must be over the age of 18.

HOW YOU CAN GET INVOLVED!

The Liverpool Eurovision Village will be based at Liverpool Waterfront and will be open for everyone to visit from 1st of May.

ALBANIA Wins:

Albania first entered the competition in 2004 coming 7th. They have taken part in every contest since that date. Highest ranking was in 2012 where they came 5th.



AUSTRALIA Wins: 0

Australia was given a one off chance to be part of the 60th Eurovision in 2015. Judges were so impressed they have been allowed to enter since. They have finished in the top ten four times and their highest place was 2nd in 2016.



ARMENIA

NIA Wins: 0

Armenia first took part in Eurovision in 2006 and has appeared 14 times since then. They have finished in the top ten 7 times and their highest placement was 4th in 2008 and 2014.

WHO IS TAKING PART?



BELGIUM

Wins: 0

Belgium was one of the original contestants in 1956. Since then they have appeared every year apart from 1994, 1997 and 2001. 13 year old Sandra Kim won the contest in 1986 and Belgium hosted the following year in the capital city, Brussels.



CROATIA Wins: 0

Croatia has taken part 27 times since 1993. Their highest place was 4th in 1996 and 1999. Although

they have not won the contest, Croatia hosted in Zagreb in 1990 as the former Yugoslavia entry, which won in 1989 was sung by Croatian band,



CYPRUS

Wins: 0

Cyprus first entered the competition in 1981 and have appeared 38 times. Although they have never won, their highest placing was 2nd in 2018. They withdrew from the contest in 2014 but decided to return in 2015.



AUSTRIA

Wins: 2

Austria has participated 54 times since its debut in 1957. The country has won twice, in 1966 and 2014 and hosted the contest in the capital city, Vienna on both occasions.



AZERBAIJAN Wins: 1

Azerbaijan first entered the contest in 2008. They were placed in the top five for the next four years before winning in 2011. They hosted the contest the following year in the capital city, Baku.





CZECH REPUBLIC OR CZECHIA Wins: 0

The Czech Republic first entered Eurovision in 2007. They withdrew from the contest between 2010 and 2014. They returned in 2015 and had their first appearance in a final in 2016. In 2018 they achieved their highest placement to date when they came 6th.



DENMARK Wins: 3

Denmark first entered the contest in 1957 and have taken part 50 times. They have won three times and always hosted the event in their capital city, Copenhagen. Copenhagen also hosted the special 50 year anniversary of Eurovision in 2005.



ESTONIA

Wins: 1

Estonia made its first appearance in 1994. In 2001 they became the first former Soviet Union country to win. The following year the contest was held in their capital city, Tallinn.



INLAND Wins: 1

Finland has participated in the contest 55 times since its debut in 1961. It has taken last place 11 times but finally won in 2006 with heavy metal band, Lordi. The following year Eurovision was held in Finland's capital, Helsinki.



FRANCE

Wins

France is one of the original contestants and also one of the most successful countries to enter Eurovision. France is one of the Big Five. Although France has won the contest 5 times, it only hosted three times in Cannes and Paris. Following their win in 1962, France couldn't afford to host again so soon and the UK hosted on their behalf.

WHO IS TAKING PART?



EECE Wins: 1

Greece has taken part 42 times since its debut in 1974, missing six contests in that time. Greece's first win came in 2005. They hosted the year after in the capital city Athens.



ICELAND

Iceland first entered the contest in 1986. Although they haven't won (to date), the country has come 2nd twice and in the top ten a further five times.

IRELAND

Ireland has been the most successful country to take part. Johnny Logan is the only singer to have won the contest twice (1980 and 1987). He also wrote the winning song for Ireland in 1992. They have hosted the contest 6 times in Dublin and once in Millstead in County



GEORGIA

Wins: 0


Georgia first entered the contest in 2007. They have taken part 14 times since then. Their highest placing came in 2010 and 2011 where they came 9th.



GERMANY

Wins: 2

Germany has taken part in the contest since the very first event in 1956 and they are also one of the Big Five. Germany has had 11 top three placements and won the contest in 1982 and 2010. They hosted the contest following their wins in Munich and Dusseldorf. They also hosted the second contest in 1957 in Frankfurt.





ISRAEL

Wins: 4

Israel first entered the contest in 1973 and were the first non-European country allowed to take part. They have won the contest four times. As they won in 1978 and 1979, they did not host in 1980. They are the only country not to take part in the year following a win. This was due to the 1980 event clashing with Israel Memorial Day. They have hosted twice in Jerusalem and once in Tel Aviv.



ITALY Wins: 3

Italy has taken part since the first contest in 1956. They are one of the Big Five so always qualify for the final. They have won the contest three times, along with an additional 15 top-five finishes. Italy has hosted the contest in

Naples, Rome and Turin.



LATVIA Wins: 1

Latvia first entered the contest in 2000. It has had mixed success over the years including the most last places in the semi-finals and a win in 2002. They hosted the following year in the capital city, Riga.



Wins: 0 LITHUANIA

Lithuania first entered the contest in 1994 where they came last. They did not enter again until 1999. Their highest placing was 6th in 2006.



Wins: 0

Malta has competed in the contest 34 times since its first entry in 1971. Although they have never won, they have achieved four top three results including two 2nd

WHO IS TAKING PART?



Wins: 3

Norway has participated in the contest 60 times since making its debut in 1960 and has only been absent twice since then. They have won the contest 3 times and hosted the contest once in Bergen and twice in the capital city, Oslo.



POLAND Wins: 0

Poland joined in 1994. They finished second in their debut year, which to date, remains the best placing for the country. The country also reached the top ten (7th place) for the second time in 2003.



PORTUGAL

Wins: 1

Portugal first entered the contest in 1964 where they finished last. They won the contest for the first time in 2017 and hosted the 2018 contest in their capital city Lisbon.



MOLDOVA

Wins: 0

Moldova has participated in the contest 17 times, debuting in 2005. The country's best result is a third-place finish for SunStroke Project in 2017, with their song "Hey, Mamma!"



NETHERLANDS Wins: 5

The Netherlands is one of the original countries who took part in the first contest in 1956. They have won the contest 5 times (one of them a four way tie with Spain, UK and France in 1969). They have hosted the contest in Hilversum, The Hague, Amsterdam and Rotterdam. They also hosted on behalf of Israel in 1980 in Amsterdam.





ROMANIA

Wins: 0

Romania first entered the competition in 1994, and has participated 22 times since. They have never won the contest, but finished in 3rd place in 2005 and 2010.



SAN MARINO Wins: 1 San Marino is the small-

est country to take part in the contest. It has participated 11 times since debuting in 2008. The nation was unable to take part in 2009 and 2011 due to financial difficulties. Italy's Måneskin won the 2021 Eurovision, so the 2022 contest was hosted in Turin, Italy.



Wins: 1

SERBIA

Serbia entered the

following year.

contest in 2007. Previously Serbia had participated in the Eurovision Song Contest as part of Yugoslavia as well as Serbia and Montenegro. The country won with its debut entry in 2007 and hosted the competition in the capital, Belgrade the



SLOVENIA Wins: 0

Slovenia first entered the contest in 1993 and has taken part 27 times since then. Whilst Slovenia has not won the Eurovision Song Contest, it did win Eurovision Choir of the Year in 2017. Their highest placing was 7th place in 1995 and 2001.



Wins: 2

Spain is one of the Big Five and has participated 61 times since making its debut in 1961. They have won the contest twice in 1968 and 1969. They hosted in 1969 in Madrid and following a four way tie in 1969, Netherlands hosted in 1970 on behalf of all four winners.



Sweden first entered the contest in 1958 and is one of the most successful countries to take part. They have won 6 times starting in 1974 with ABBA's Waterloo. This win launched ABBA's international career which is still going strong today. Sweden hosted the contest three times in Stockholm, twice in Malmö and once in Gothenburg.



SWITZERLAND Wins: 2

Switzerland has participated in the contest since 1956. They won the very first edition of the competition which they also hosted in Lugano. Following their second win, they hosted in Lausanne.



Wins: 3

Ukraine first took part in 2003. Ukraine has won Eurovision three times. They are the first Eastern European Country with three victories. They have hosted in Kyiv and this year, the contest will be hosted in Liverpool, UK, on their behalf.



The UK first entered Eurovision in 1957. To date, they have won 5 times. The UK has also finished second a record 16 times. They have hosted 9 times (another record) in London, Brighton, Harrogate, Birmingham, Edinburgh and now Liverpool. Five of these hosting events were on behalf of other countries - Netherlands (1960), France (1963), Monaco (1972), Luxembourg (1974) and Ukraine (2023).



The Liver Birds are called Bella and Bertie. Bella watches over those on the river, Bertie watches over those on the land.

Legend says if they ever meet face to face, they will fly away, and the City would cease to exist.


The Ukrainian flag is blue and yellow. Blue for the sky, and yellow for the golden grain they produce. The Ukraine is known as the bread basket of Europe.


BINITA'S EGGS








MAKE YOUR OWN EGGS

Can you decorate your own eggs? All around the world eggs are seen as a symbol of new beginnings, new starts and new life.



Lots of Eurovision countries decorate eggs around this time of year including Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Georgia, Greece, Germany, Lithuania, Poland, Romania, Slovenia and Switzerland.

Each country has their own way of doing this.



A LITTLE HELP FROM MY FRIENDS

Scouse is a very popular dish in Liverpool. Bilal is making some using his good friend Tony's recipe.

OUR TONY'S HOMEMADE SCOUSE RECIPE

Serves 4-6. Prep time 35 mins. Cooking time 2-4 hours. You will need a good large heavy casserole or large pan with a lid. Can be done in a slow cooker.

INGREDIENTS:

- 500g braising beef diced into 5cm chunks (dry the beef with kitchen towel if needed)
- 1 large red onion finely diced
- 4 large carrots cut to medium sized chunks (similar size to your beef)
- 3 large celery sticks finely sliced
- 1 small swede cut to medium sized chunks
- 4 tablespoons of cornflour or plain flour
- 500g of good all round potatoes (Maris Piper or King Edwards) cut to roughly double the size of the beef.
- 2 beef stock cubes dissolved in 500ml hot water
- 1 sprig of fresh rosemary finely chopped (or 1 or 2 tablespoon of dried)
- Good handful of fresh thyme finely chopped (or 1 or 2 tablespoon of dried)
- 1/4 block of beef dripping (or 2 tablespoons of veg oil)
- Sea salt
- White pepper (or black pepper)

TO SERVE

- Fresh crusty bread and butter
- Pickled red cabbage and pickled beetroot



METHOD:

Make sure your beef is taken out of the fridge for an hour and then season generously with the sea salt and pepper.

In a large heavy casserole or pan, melt the dripping or oil on medium to high heat and brown the cubes of beef. Do this in small batches so as not to overcrowd the pan as the beef will start to poach. You are looking to get a bit of colour or brown the beef but the aim is not to cook it through at this stage. Remove beef once browned and set aside.

Add the diced onion, celery, carrot into the pan and continue to fry on medium heat, stirring so the onions etc don't catch to the base of the pan, adding more dripping or oil if needed. When the onions and celery are cooked through they should look clear and there should be some brown edges to the onion. Add the finely chopped or dried herbs and fry for a few more minutes.

Be careful not to burn the herbs! Keep everything moving with a spoon. Add the flour to the pan and stir. You want the flour to take up any excess oil. Cook for one or two minutes while continuously stirring.

Add the beef back to the pan along with the potatoes, swede and then the beef stock, stir everything through. At this point you can judge if there is enough liquid in the pan. You want the ingredients to be two thirds covered with the liquid. You can add more hot water if needed.

Turn the heat to the lowest setting and place the lid on the casserole leaving it to simmer on the hob for 2 hours. You could put the casserole in the oven at 160oC/gas mark 3 if you are using an oven-proof dish for 2-3 hours. Or at this point you could put everything into a slow cooker for 4/6 hours. Stir occasionally with a wooden spoon. You can add more water if it's looking dry.

Once you see the potatoes breaking up and the dish is thickening, it's ready to serve. Add more salt and pepper to taste. Serve with the fresh crusty bread and butter, pickled red cabbage and beetroot.

EVEN MORE HELP FROM MY FRIENDS

Today, Bilal wants to try something new, so he calls his friend, Anna for some suggestions. Anna gives him this brilliant recipe for a traditional Ukrainian Dish. It's called Borscht and is a very popular and important dish to the people in Ukraine.

Why don't you make some Borscht?

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 litres of water
- 300g pork ribs with meat
- 1 medium-sized beetroot
- 2 medium-sized potatoes
- 1 medium-sized onion
- 1 large carrot
- 150g aubergine
- 150g cabbage
- 100g beans (canellini or something similar)
- 2 tbsp tomato paste
- 1 tbsp sugar
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 garlic cloves
- 2 tbsp sunflower oil
- salt, black pepper, and peppercorns to taste



METHOD:

Rinse and bake 1 beetroot in the oven for 1.5 hours. Then let it cool, peel it, and cut it into thin strips (or grate)

Soak 100g of beans in water for an hour. (Canned beans don't need soaking)


Season 300g of pork ribs with salt and roast them in the oven with garlic, bay leaves, and peppercorns for 20 minutes at 180 degrees Celsius/gas mark 4. Then let them cool and separate the meat from the bones.

Peel and grate a large carrot, finely chop a medium-sized onion, and dice the aubergine.

Sauté (cook the food quickly over a fairly high heat) the onion and carrot for 2-3 minutes, then add the beetroot and aubergine. Cook for another 2 minutes. Then add tomato paste and sugar and let it simmer for 2 minutes over low heat.

Peel and cut the potatoes into medium-sized cubes. Add the potatoes and pork ribs to a large pot of water and bring to a boil. Then cook for another 5 minutes over low heat.

Add the beans and sliced cabbage. Cook for 15 minutes. Add the prepared sauté and cook for another 5-7 minutes. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Finally, add the puree made from two garlic cloves. You can also make this dish vegetarian by using more beetroot and adding a red or green pepper instead of the meat.



Borscht often tastes even better the next day, if you leave it to settle overnight.




YOUR SONG FOR EUROVISION


Lordi won Eurovision in 2006 with their winning song, Hard Rock, Hallelujah! They were the first heavy metal/hard rock band to take part in the contest.




Conchita won Eurovision in 2014, with her song, Rise Like a Phoenix. She had an amazing beard, just like Barbara, our bearded butterfly.
